


Home Learning Pack: Study Skills

Without the structure of the regular school day, it can be difficult for pupils to plan their time and stay focused. These resources are aimed at children in Key Stage Two and above to help them develop independent study skills such as time management, research, recording information and reflecting on learning.

Resource	How to use
What time is it?	Revise how to tell the time. Compare to digital times and discuss the importance of time management.
Days of the Week	Review the days of the week. Put into the correct order. Use to make a weekly timetable.
My Calendar	Fill in the dates for the week. Fill in any fun activities you have planned. Explain the importance of making sure you play and have fun as well as study.
Activities Tracker	Choose three educational/helpful activities together that you would like to focus on this week. You can add your own ideas at the bottom of the table. Your child can colour in a box every time they complete an activity. Use the scoresheet to work out points and bonuses. Set a realistic target for the weekly total and negotiate a reward or celebration for reaching the target.
My Daily Planner	Ask your child to spend ten minutes in the morning using this to plan work for the day. Note down tasks to complete. Record the time it takes to complete them. Negotiate a reward for completion of a certain number of tasks. This could be ten minutes of a game, a quick video, a snack Your child can colour in the water glasses as they drink water to help them remember to hydrate. We recommend keeping these daily planners to show your child's teacher to help them judge the amount of work set.
My New Words	Encourage your child to use this as they study. Record new words. In the 'How will I remember this?' column, your child can use it in a sentence, draw a picture, write similar words, write a short poem etc.
Topic Summary	Use this tool to record key information from a topic. Your child can write down questions they want to ask their teacher later.
My Home Learning Reflection	Ask your child to spend ten minutes at the end of the day reflecting on what they have achieved and learned. We recommend you keep these reflections to show your child's teacher to help keep track of your child's understanding and emotional health.
Fake News	This resource gives a brief overview of the topic of fake news. Ask your child to read it and complete the comprehension questions. Discuss the questions and use this to help prepare your child for doing online research.
Online Research	Use this tool to help your child focus their online research and record notes from different websites. Discuss the importance of choosing useful key phrases to search and review why it is a good idea to look at multiple websites.



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


You look at your tasks for the day and see that you need to find out information about a current topic. Where do you start? When you're doing research at home, you don't have the option of putting your hand up to ask your teacher for help. Nowadays, we have access to endless information on the internet, but unfortunately, not everything you read online is true. One way to make sure your information is correct is to check your sources. Anyone can edit a website like Wikipedia, so although it is a good place to start for basic information,



make sure you scroll down to see the sources. Click on the links to go to the website where the information was originally posted. Can you verify that it is true? Usually, if information is factual, there will be multiple sources confirming it.

If we see a headline that says 'Studies show...' it is natural to trust that it is based on scientific fact. However, can you find the studies it mentions, and does the article actually reflect the conclusions? If you see a news story that is similar to what you already believe, it's very easy to think that it's true when it may not be. You should be prepared to question everything! Now that social media is so popular, it is very easy for people to share information without checking that it is accurate, so fake news stories can spread quickly. If you see a story on social media, try to find out where the story has come from. Is it from a genuine news website? Can you find out any more information about the organisation or person who published it?
